FOR IMMEDIATE RELEASE - December 14, 2015 - On Thursday night's 58th Annual Arizona School Boards (ASBA) Conference, CFSD President Carole Siegler was named a member of the 5-member All Arizona School Board, the highest honor bestowed on school board members in Arizona.

The award goes to those leaders who exemplify dedication and commitment to school board service on behalf of the children of their school districts. According to ASBA, recipients of this award demonstrate best-practices in boardsmanship, understand their roles and follow through on their responsibilities. Nomination by board action is required and a selection committee chooses the winners.

"She treats fellow board members with respect and encourages input from all, recognizing that all board members, both experienced and developing, have something to offer."
