

World Languages Standard Catalina Foothills School District High School 6 (HS6)

Advanced Placement Spanish Literature is the equivalent of a university course and requires a sophisticated command of Spanish grammar and vocabulary and competence in listening, reading, speaking, and writing. AP Spanish Lit focuses on selected authors from the literature of Spain and Latin America and on the understanding and analysis of literary texts. The course will prepare students to demonstrate competence on the Advanced Placement Spanish Literature Exam and/or the AP Spanish Language Exam. The targeted proficiency level by the end of AP Spanish Literature and Culture is *Intermediate High to Advanced Low* for reading, and *Intermediate High* for writing (based on the ACTFL Proficiency Guidelines).

1. Person-to-Person Communication (Interpersonal)

3. ORAL AND V	VRITTEN PRESENTATION

WL.HS6.3.2	Presents through an oral presentation and a formal written essay (time and length will vary) an analysis of a short story, poem, or chapter from a novel (required: states the major themes and literary devices, historical/sociological context in which a selected work was written, literary movements to which a selected work belongs).

WL.HS6.4.1	Describes and compares accepted artistic trends in each literary movement (for example: Medieval, Renaissance, Baroque, Romanticism, Modernism).
WL.HS6.4.2	Explains how literature and the arts reflect the cultural practices and perspectives of the target culture (for example: in Modernism, originality is valued over inclusion of all members of the general public; in Renaissance literature, the concept of "honor" is a significant value).
